



- Anatomy, Physiology, General Biology, Biochemistry, General and Organic Chemistry, Microbiology, Behavioral Sciences, Genetics, Statistics
- 240 questions, 4.5 hours, currently required by 15 PA programs; could grow to more programs in coming years

Patient care experience (PCE)

Experiences in which you are directly responsible for a patient's health.

EMT, CNA, medical assistant, phlebotomist, dental assistant, physical therapy assistant, medical scribe, health aide

Healthcare experience (HCE)

Work in a health-related field where you are not directly responsible for a patient's care, but still have patient interaction

PCE is always valued more highly in the admissions process.

Communicate Background, strengths, unique Fit for the profession Academic preparation

A well-rounded application shows...

- Ability to communicate effectively on the application and in an interview
- Background, strengths, and what makes you unique
- Passion and fit for the PA profession and healthcare
- Ability to do the academic work

Timeline

January-May: Take GRE

April: Application opens; apply by May to be most competitive

May-August: Secondary applications

July-March: Interviews and decisions

June/July/August: PA school begins
