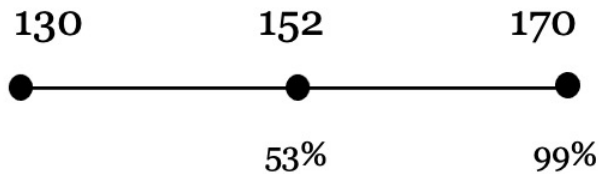

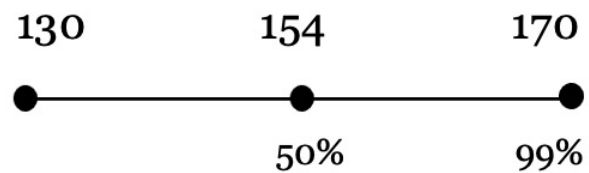

A well-rounded application shows...

- Ability to communicate effectively on the application and in an interview
- Background, strengths, and what makes you unique
- Passion and fit for the dental profession
- Ability to do the academic work

Timeline

January-July: Take GRE

January: Application opens

May: Begin submitting applications

Verification: 4-6 weeks after submission

After application is verified, it is released to schools. Some schools will have secondary or supplemental applications.

September 15: Application deadline

October-March: Schools review, select candidates to interview, and release decisions

July/August: Veterinary school begins

- The earliest you can apply for veterinary school is the summer after junior year. Many applicants choose to take a gap year(s) and will delay applying until the summer after senior year or even the year after graduation.

Parts of the Application

- Biographical information
 - Transcripts
- Letters of Recommendation
- Personal Statement (Essay)
 - Experiences (Resume)
