

# Graduate School research and comparison

There are many factors to consider when evaluating an advanced degree. This worksheet is designed to help you identify key factors in evaluating your options. You should evaluate at least three programs.

<b>Type of degree/program of interest</b> Example: Master of Business Administration (MBA), Master of Arts (MA), Doctor of Medicine (MD), Juris Doctor (JD)					
<b>Brief description of school and program</b> Example: The MS in Criminal Justice prepares students to acquire jobs or advance their careers in the field of criminal justice policy and practice. Students receive the scientific foundations and practical insights required to evaluate, select, and implement criminal justice policies and practices that are effective, efficient, and fair. They also learn data analysis skills that equip them with the knowledge required for many policy-oriented and front- line operational positions. Criminal Justice, MS graduates are prepared to be leaders and change agents in the criminal justice field.

<b>Program focus</b> Example: theoretical, research-driven, practical/applied, skills-based					
<b>Method of instruction</b> Example: in-person, online, hybrid					
<b>Program start</b> Example: fall only, any semester					
<b>Student to faculty ratio</b> Example: 12 students to 1 faculty					
<b>Advising/mentoring</b> Example: faculty advisor, optional peer mentor					

<b>Average time to complete degree</b> Example: overall rate of graduation for the program; percentage of students who graduate within a specified number of years

## Program costs and funding opportunities

Tuition is the cost of taking classes at your school - actual instruction. Tuition is not the full cost of attendance, which can also include fees, books and supplies, and more. These other costs vary by school/program, and you should investigate each program to learn the full price of attendance.

## Admission requirements

Even among programs with similar admissions requirements, not all programs define a successful applicant the same way. Research those programs interesting to you and see how your background aligns with the profile of a typically accepted student. Refer to the program website first and be prepared to reach out to the program if you cannot find the information online.

<p>*After you have learned more about each program, consider identifying it as a Stretch, Target, or Safety option. To increase your chances of admission, aim for an application to at least one program from each category.</p> <p><b>Stretch</b> = your credentials fall in the lower end (or below) the Accepted Student Profile, making you a less competitive candidate (but if it's your dream school, apply!)</p> <p><b>Target</b> = your credentials fall well within the Accepted Student Profile, making you a competitive candidate</p> <p><b>Safety</b> = your credentials meet or exceed the Accepted Student Profile, making you a highly competitive candidate</p>
