 Questions for LGBTQ Students Are there staff/centers that work directly to support LGBTQ students? What housing accommodations are available for transgender or gender-nonconforming students? What policies exist around using chosen names instead of legal names given at birth? How do students indicate their chosen pronouns? Do you have a culture in which people share their pronouns upon introduction? 			
 Questions for Religious Minorities Are there interfaith houses of worship or spaces for students who are religious minorities? Are these dedicated or shared spaces, and are they safe and monitored? Do students have the resources and spaces needed to practice their faith on campus? What dining options are available to accommodate a diet for religious practices? How easy or difficult is it to get dining accommodations for such diets? If I need to request specific dietary accommodation, where would I address that concern? 			
 Questions for Politically Active Students What political clubs or student organizations are available to join? What kind of speakers has the university brought to campus? What are the campus free speech policies? What are the most controversial issues on campus/in the department right now?
