

Timeline

January-June: Take DAT

May: Application opens; apply by June to be most competitive

June-August: Secondary applications

August-December: Interviews and decisions

July/August: Dental school begins

- Biographical information
 - Transcripts
- Letters of Recommendation
- Personal Statement (Essay)
 - <u>Experiences</u> (Resume)
 - School Selection
